## Transformed Lives

## Luke 19:1-10

"No one can come to me unless the Father who sent me draws him." John 6:44. Perhaps the clearest evidence of God's work in the heart of a nonbeliever is that person's genuine desire to $\qquad$ .

Discussion 1. Give an example you have seen or heard about of a person who is demonstrating a genuine curiosity about Jesus or a genuine desire to see Him. What did that curiosity look/feel when it was you seeking Him?

Discussion 3. What kind of "fruit" or outward behavior of a truly changed heart would stand out in our culture? What does it look like in genuine Christ followers you know?

Changing people's behavior was never enough for Jesus. That is not why He came. He came to change people's $\qquad$ . When His followers stay focused on that purpose, the church is at its best.

Discussion 4. As we have difficult discussions with friends and family about important social issues like abortion or immigration or health care, what is the difference between focusing on changing people's outward behavior and changing people's hearts? How does that shift change your approach?

Discussion 5. How does this lesson cause you to pray? How does it prepare your heart for worship?
