| Discussion 2. If I just do not want to pray, how/why is that more than just an attitude problem? How might it be evidence of a spiritual problem? What do you think is the remedy for it? |

| Discussion 3. Do you believe there is a connection between our prayer life and our obedience to God? How would you describe that connection? Is it possible to be obedient to God without staying in regular communication with Him? Why or why not? |
